

Who Are We?

- Started in 1947 by seven shooters. The club moved a total of four times before occupying the current location in 1961.
- Mission Statement: La Junta Rifle Club will foster the development of all shooting sports by providing opportunities for members and youth to receive shooting instruction; by providing a safe venue for shooting; by promoting organized shooting competitions; by promoting fellowship and good sportsmanship; and by providing opportunities for family activities while keeping firearm safety paramount in the pursuit of all of these activities.
- Current range consists of a rifle range, pistol pit, trap range, skeet range, indoor pistol range, archery range and club house.

Our Club

- LJRC is an unattended club with **membership** dues of \$45.00 the first year and \$35.00 each subsequent year. Members pay for clay targets for shot gun sports and a \$1.00 range fee. Guests of a club member pay \$2.00.
- LJRC has eight, range safety officers with training paid by the club. Nine members are trained leaders for the 4-H shooting sports in Otero County and hold certification in rifle, shotgun, archery, and black powder rifles. Two members hold advance NRA training and provide concealed carry classes. One current member teaches DPW hunter safety classes.

Project 1 Barrier Safety Wall

- Problem: Trap shooter at position one, on trap field 3, is in view of skeet shooter at positions
 1, 2, & 8
- Problem: Can only shoot trap or skeet

 Solution: A twelve foot barrier wall, seventy five foot in length will allow the Club to shoot trap and skeet at the same time

Trap and Skeet Field



Pistol Range

- The pistol range has been enhanced by secure berms.
- The pistol range has been expanded to allow for additional shooters.
- The pistol range will match the rifle range esthetically.
- 4-H shooting sports in Otero County has 38 shooters:
 Seventeen Seniors ages 15 to 18; Eleven Intermediate ages 11 to 14; and Ten Juniors ages 8 to 10.
- The pistol range allows for 5 events for the shooting of 22 rifles. Targets are placed at 50 feet and require 10 shots each from standing, kneeling, sitting, and prone positions.
- Concealed carry classes are held monthly requiring three hours of shooting.
- Hunter safety classes can now be held in a safe and secure location.
- Construction of a concrete pad for shooting needs to be completed.

Trap and Skeet Range Handicapped Individuals

- Twenty percent of our club members are in their late 60's and 70's and have trouble navigating over a sand, rock, and prairie surface. Wheel chairs cannot be used because of the roughness of the ground.
- A solid surface will enhance the footing and appearance of the trap and skeet range.
- It will also compliment the new barrier wall.

- Improved access will allow club members to have gatherings at the club house
 - ➤ New shooter get-togethers
 - ► 4-H functions
 - Fun days scheduled by the club
 - ➤ Hunter safety shooting
